Robert Blizzard of UpONE Insights completed a survey of N=500 registered voters in Iowa via landline and cell phone.



The survey was conducted September 17-19, 2024.




The overall survey has a margin of error of \pm 4.38%. The margin of error for subgroups varies and is higher.



The Political Environment




Iowans are evenly divided on whether the state is moving in the right direction or if the state is off on the wrong track.





The Governor and the State Legislature have positive approval ratings, but neither are over 50%.






Voters place inflation and rising costs, K-12 public education, and the economy and jobs atop the state's issue agenda.






Attitudes Toward Gambling




Generally speaking, nearly two-thirds of Iowans support casino gambling in the state.






There's a bit of a generational divide on casino gambling, with younger lowans generally driving support.






Iowans are much more evenly divided on the issues of online sports betting by mobile app and online casino games like poker and blackjack.






We see a deep generational gap on online gambling.






By more than two-to-one, lowans oppose expanding gambling by adding more casinos in the state.






Voters across the state oppose expanding gambling and adding more casinos.





Even younger voters, among the strongest supporters of gambling in general, oppose expanding gambling and adding more casinos.






Casino Moratorium



Very few Iowans have seen, read, or heard "a lot" about the moratorium expiring.




A strong majority of Iowa voters support the Iowa State Legislature passing a moratorium to stop new casinos from being built.




Voters across party lines support the moratorium. Both Trump and Harris voters support it.






Voters across most age groups support the moratorium.






Voters across the state support the moratorium.






Even those who have been to a casino or placed an online sports bet support the moratorium on new casinos being built in Iowa.





This does not really appear to be a voting issue for lowans though – most say how their Legislator voted on it would make "no difference" in their support.






New Cedar Rapids Casino




Few Iowans outside of the Cedar Rapids market have seen, read, or heard "a lot" about a proposal to build a new casino in Cedar Rapids.






Iowans oppose a new casino being built in Cedar Rapids, including voters who reside in the Cedar Rapids market.

Moratorium Messaging



The strongest messaging for a moratorium – misplaced priorities for the legislature and the state is already saturated with enough casinos.

As we saw with the opioid epidemic, allowing more casinos in new parts of the state will lure even more lowans into addiction and new gambling debt that will disproportionately harm those who can least afford it. These messages aren't as convincing for voters.

Put simply, allowing more casinos would mean more casinos would be built. Without a moratorium, there would be an expansion of gambling, which is bad for preserving our strong family values here in lowa. Building a new casino in Cedar Rapids has already been tried before, but was stopped because studies showed it would harm the profits from the nearby casinos in more rural communities in Waterloo, Riverside and Dubuque - harming those rural communities at the expense of urban lowa. 
Importantly, about two-thirds of Iowans take a "noseholder" position on gambling and new casinos.




The strongest message against a moratorium – the tax revenue that can help communities raise money without tax or cost increases.

Casino gambling brings millions of dollars in tax revenue into local lowa communities that help pay for improved public schools, infrastructure, health care, and local law enforcement.
